AVALANCHE AWARENESS AND SAFETY

Doug Brown of the Northwest Avalanche Center (NWAC) will discuss the basics of avalanche awareness and safety. Where do you get avalanche

forecasts, assessing possible risks, and staying safe? While most XC skiers will not be on terrain that will slide itself, you may be below it. Moreover, there are "micro-avalanche" risks from trees and rocks.

The NWAC has asked us to register for the event here.
Like us, they depend upon state grants to do their vital work to help people stay safe in the mountains. Preventing accidents, in the first place, through education is a major part of their mission. We help them by registering so that they can document their outreach efforts.

END OF DECEMBER SALMON RIDGE SNOPARK REPORT

A circuit of Razor Hone and Cougar Loop in late December found no snow, a couple of downed trees, and a few scattered branches. All but the lack of snow were readily taken care of. At the moment, all we have is gravel, but the ground is cold and snow could stick.

White Salmon has sufficient snow at the top which thins out as one goes down the long hill to the low point. There have been a few trucks driving on the snow (which is legal, per Forest Service rules), but one more snowfall should take care of that problem. As always, parking there is limited. Please leave as much room for others as possible.

WASHINGTON PASS AND CUTTHROAT LAKE

Before the Methow Valley has snow, it is often possible to ski groomed track on service roads at higher elevations around Washington Pass and Cutthroat Lake off Highway 20. When the pass closes, typically grooming moves down to areas still accessible from the East side (i.e., Mazama) by car, like Klipchuck Campground. In past years these areas were prepared by a local skier with his own grooming equipment and primarily used by the most avid of X-country skiers for early season conditioning.

This year Methow Trails has taken on the task prior to the valley trails opening (no ticket required). I was able to ski short loops at both the Pass and at the Lake starting in early November. There is very limited parking off the side of 20 in pullout indents (thank you WSDOT), carpooling is a must. You can now see these early season reports on the Methow Trails website. I was skiing Nov 8 this year. I doubt it would be worth driving all the way over for the limited available skiing, but if you are already in the area, it is a delightful way to get a jump on the season.

PVST Trails Update from Jason Boyes, Trails Manager: "Day 3... We are continuing to open in stages and today we bring you all of the northern parts of our trail system. We are opening Beaver Creek Trailhead and giving you your first chance to use the new Osprey Lodge Trailhead at the 1000 main **Trails** entrance. (No longer the Clear Creek Trailhead). Grooming was done yesterday afternoon and evening with Ginzus laying skate and classic where possible.

Overnight lows hovered right around freezing, so conditions could be soft on any of the newly opened trails which don't have the same base as what was done with the Sno-Cat. The firmest trails will still be the Meadow Loop area.

The entire Beaver Creek Trail is passable but watch out for thin and icy spots under the trees and use caution on all road and driveway crossing which will be thin."

As always, use caution in the parking lots as there could be ice (Micro Spikes recommended) and as temps warm up things could get slushy (4wd recommended).

Our Nordic Pulse map is a work in progress as we are still coordinating the GPS tracking to align with the actual trails, but all trails are currently open except for Mill Hill, Cougar Run and Chainsaw Ridge. Let's hope that the forecast gets better and that this rain turns into more snow."

NICKEL PLATE TRIP MONDAY MARCH 3rd TO THURSDAY MARCH 6th, 2025

Nickel Plate Nordic Centre in the Okanagan Valley, just 45 minutes from Penticton. It has approximately 34 miles of groomed trails for both classic and skate skiing. Additionally, there is 9 miles of marked snowshoe trails. Nickel Plate has one of the longest ski seasons in the western hemisphere, with trails for all abilities. Elevation is 6,000 feet.

Nickel Plate has a warm and cozy 4,000 square foot day lodge with kitchen, eating and lounge areas, and separate heated washrooms and shower facilities. Source: nickelplatenordic.org.

Housing - We will be staying at the Best Western Inn in Penticton, BC. We will drive to the Nickel Plate Nordic Center from the hotel. Rooms have 2 queen beds. Cost is \$290 for the room, plus tax recovery charges service and fees/charges using Hotel.Com as of January 3, 2025. you can make reservations with Best Western Inn at (833) 372-5731 (price may different then Hotels.com).
